2023 Regional Campaigns



Our rural voting programs led to strong champions elected to city councils and county commissions in Grand Junction, CO, and Billings, Livingston, and Great Falls, MT.



WORC members created a comprehensive Farm Bill platform prioritizing antitrust in livestock markets, soil health, local foods, and fair labor standards for farm and food workers.



WORC and our allies provided extensive feedback to the USDA on the implementation of several programs to get federal funds for rural clean energy to the communities that need them most.



WORC led a successful legal challenge of DOI's flawed Buffalo and Miles City Resource Management Plans leading to a new environmental analysis that includes air impacts and a no-leasing alternative.



WORC built strong public support for BLM's new reclamation bond requirements, ensuring that oil and gas companies will honor their cleanup obligations when the oil or gas runs out.
